IRW LC Scholars will explore how attention to gender complicates and challenges contemporary understandings, uses and expressions of agency (or the ability to make and implement choices). We will consider whether there are explicitly gendered forms of agency, and if so, how these are constituted, expressed and experienced at different times, in different places, and through different media. By thinking about the relationship of gender and agency through a comparative, interdisciplinary lens, LC Scholars will investigate: What does agency mean? How is it constituted and expressed? Where is it located? How does agency shape and become shaped by structures of power, for example colonialism, capitalism, religion, and the media? How do women and men respond, sometimes simultaneously, in ways that are gendered, creative, complicit, resistant, effective, or self-destructive?

Through readings, group discussion, participation in the IRW Distinguished Lecture Series, and faculty mentoring, scholars will create an intellectual space where they will develop research skills and theoretical understandings in preparation for independent or collaborative scholarship.

Learning Community Scholars are expected to:

- Attend the three IRW Distinguished Lectures on September 17th, October 8th, and October 29th, from 4:30-6pm.
- Participate in group discussions of readings and lectures at the Thursday seminars. All of the readings are posted on the Sakai IRW LC site and should read them in preparation for the class meeting for which they are indicated.
- Attend research information session at Douglass library on October 15th.
- Participate in moderated class discussions on the Sakai IRW LC site.
- Present an individual or group final project to a public audience of family members, friends and IRW Mentors during the third week of December. Projects should be linked to the IRW theme "Gendered Agency" and can take a variety of forms, such as a research report, social action project, or website. Scholars will meet at least once with an IRW mentor (faculty member or advanced graduate student) and at least twice with the LC Coordinator to discuss their project.
